## ATLANTA WOMAN'S CLUB RECEIVES TOP HONORS AT 5<sup>th</sup> DISTRICT MEETING

The Atlanta Woman's Club was honored at the March 17th meeting in Fairburn of the 5th District of the Georgia Federation of Women's Clubs (GaFWC). Our Club won only first-place/"Best" awards this year with an unusually high number of 16 awards. Coming up is the state convention at Calloway Gardens, April 15-17. See last page for more info.

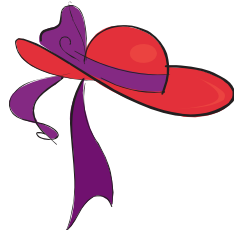

### ATHOS MENABONI: ATLANTA’S GIFTED ARTIST

At the March General Meeting, I was honored to present to the Atlanta Woman’s Club a gift of two lithographs by Atlanta’s Athos Menaboni (1895-1990). Menaboni’s talent ran the gamut, but he became most famous for his painting of birds. In 1950, *TIME* magazine declared Menaboni “Audubon’s heir.” His work appeared on the covers of *Progressive Farmer* and *Sports Illustrated*, and his birds continue to illustrate *World Book Encyclopedia*. His paintings can be found in a book, written by his wife Sara, entitled

*Menaboni’s Birds*, that was published in 1950. Today, his murals can be seen in Atlanta at the Peacock House and at the Atlanta History Center’s Swan House.

Athos Menaboni’s two greatest Atlanta patrons were Mills B. Lane and Robert W. Woodruff. Menaboni painted several murals and other works that Mr. Lane hung in his C & S Bank buildings across Georgia. From 1941 to 1984, Menaboni’s art appeared on the personal Christmas cards of Mr. Woodruff.

In 2007, a gallery honoring Athos Menaboni’s life and art opened at Kennesaw State University because of the generous support of the Robert W. Woodruff Foundation. The university is trying to collect as many Woodruff Christmas cards as possible and is interested in anyone who has Menaboni art. *If any AWC members own or know of others who own Menaboni art, including any of the 44 Christmas cards Menaboni painted for Robert Woodruff, please contact me, Russ Clayton at 770-422-6987 or e-mail me ([russ.clayton59@gmail.com](mailto:russ.clayton59@gmail.com)) at any time. Thank you for your assistance in this project.*

*Editor’s Note:* The Atlanta Woman’s Club acknowledges with grateful appreciation the generous, thoughtful gift from Russell Clayton of the two beautiful Menaboni lithographs, “Mourning Doves” and “Bobwhite Quail” printed in 1962. They will soon be hanging in just the right location in the Wimbish House, which was the site of the first art gallery in Atlanta in the 1920’s. Located on the campus of Kennesaw State University is the Don Russell Clayton Gallery in the Bailey Performance Center. The Clayton Gallery provides exhibition space for works from the KSU Permanent Collection of Art. Funded by a \$1 million grant from the Robert W. Woodruff Foundation, the Clayton Gallery is the primary exhibition space for the Athos Menaboni Collection, which was donated by KSU alumnus Russell Clayton.

### Earth Day-April 22

The idea behind the day honoring the planet and all living things that inhabit it began during the early 1960's hippie movement. Earth Day bloomed into a grass roots cause that eventually culminated in the first official U.S. observance started by United States Senator Gaylord Nelson on April 22, 1970. New York City decided to get involved by shutting down 5th Avenue as well as utilizing Central Park as the central area for celebrating. It was estimated that nearly one million people participated in New York City alone. This initial celebration was so popular that it immediately became a national holiday.

Earth Day is now celebrated in over 100 countries across the globe.

**Conserving energy in the Bathrooms and Laundry**  
Here are some methods to reduce energy consumption in the laundry room and the bathroom by decreasing hot water use and minimizing the operation of appliances.

#### **Use Cold-Water Detergent**

Though it might be difficult to make the connection at first, in recent years lowly laundry detergent has become an impact player in the field of energy conservation. Cold-water detergents clean nearly every type of clothing as well as conventional detergents, and because water does not need to be heated in order to make them work, energy savings can be realized on laundry day.

#### **Fill Up the Machine**

It is important, too, for both water and energy savings to do full loads of laundry whenever possible. Running a washing machine to do one large load as opposed to several smaller ones uses less electricity to power the machine's motor, and overall water consumption will be lower as well. So letting laundry stack up a bit is not a sign of laziness; it's saving energy.

#### **Hang 'em High**

Clothes dryers tumble clothing inside a heated drum to remove moisture soaked up during the washing process. The heat is produced by electricity, or natural or propane gas. But you can avoid using any energy at all (well, except some of your own) to dry clothes by using the sun and wind to do the job. Clotheslines and folding dryers are inexpensive, and it takes only a few minutes to hang a load of wash. An alternative to hanging clothing outside is to set up a place inside for drying.

#### **Check Your Routine**

Saving energy in a household can involve some simple habit changing. Here's an example. To save a bit of energy and water, try brushing your teeth first before you wash your face. You're going to use cold water to brush your teeth and your wait for the hot water will be shorter to wash your face.

#### **Take Shorter Showers, Smaller Baths**

One of the mantras of energy conservation is doing more with less. Some modern showerheads come with a simple shut-off valve located near the nozzle that allows you to turn off the flow of water and turn it back on again without affecting the temperature setting. Ditto in regard to the bath. Filling a bathtub an inch or two lower is unlikely to make any difference from a hygiene standpoint, and the water and energy saved add up.

Thank you again for all of the returned reporting forms for 2010. As you know, AWC won 1st place in Conservation at the District level because of the awesome job each of you do on a daily basis. Remember to keep track of any ways that you change your home environment and habits that conserve resources; any recycling, donations of used appliances, furniture, clothing, etc; money donated to approved environmental groups; all volunteer hours contributed to garden clubs, conservation groups, Earth Day Events, etc.

## Public Issues Community Service Program

Historic Fourth Ward Park, one of the first of the new Atlanta Beltline parks, is unofficially open and welcoming visitors. Phase I is a 5-acre greenspace that includes a beautiful 2-acre storm water lake (which also helps the city meet the terms of a federal sewer system consent decree); a 350-seat natural amphitheater; walkways, waterfalls and fountains; and installations by local artists. Phase II will add another 12 acres to the park and will connect to Ralph McGill Boulevard and will include a public skate park. An official Grand Opening ceremony will be held later this spring when Phase II is completed. The park's address is 680 Dallas Street, Atlanta 30308, located one block south of City Hall East and bordered by Morgan Street on the north, Rankin Street on the south, Edith Street on the east and Garden Park Drive on the west. It's open from 6 a.m. – 11 p.m. daily. For more information on the park and other aspects of the Beltline, go to [www.beltline.org](http://www.beltline.org).



The proposed National Women's History Museum has hit a snag in Congress. After passing the House of Representatives on a voice vote and unanimously out of the Senate Committee on Environment and Public Works in the last session of Congress, the bill establishing the museum has been placed on hold by two senators, Jim DeMint (R-SC) and Tom Coburn (R-OK). The National Women's Museum Act (S. 2129) was introduced last session by Senator Susan Collins (R-ME) with 19 cosponsors from both parties. In introducing the bill, Senator Collins said, "This museum would help ensure that future generations understand what we owe to the many generations of American women who have helped build, sustain, and advance our society. They deserve a building to present the stories of pioneering women like abolitionist Harriet Tubman, founder of the Girl Scouts, Juliette Gordon Low, Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, and astronaut Sally Ride." Please contact your senators and let them know your feelings about this important Washington, D.C. memorial.

The National Disaster Search Dog Foundation works to strengthen disaster response in America by recruiting rescued dogs and partnering them with firefighters and

other first responders to find people buried alive in the wreckage of disasters. The professionally trained canines and an ongoing training program are provided at no cost to fire departments; the organization also ensures lifetime care for every dog in the program. The Foundation deployed six teams to Japan to help search for survivors of the recent earthquake/tsunami devastation. #### Lodge to be "Reborn" as Middle School Campus

The Lodge at Tallulah Falls closed in December, 2010 due to the current downturn in the economy. Tallulah Falls School (TFS) acquired the lodge on December 19, 2010. School administrators and the school Board of Trustees sought the answer to what is the best use of the 28,789 square foot building. Because of the core school value that "students are at the heart of everything we do," it was determined that the lodge facility would make an ideal Middle School Campus. "We are, basically recycling and repurposing an entire building," said President Larry Peevy.

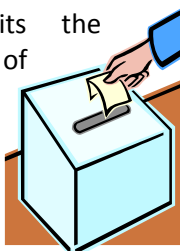
David Chester, Middle School Principal and Director of Day Students, said "The Middle School Campus will give us a true identity as a middle school."

The Board of Trustees for TFS met on January 29th and voted unanimously to move forward with the Middle School Campus project. This decision ensures a March 1st start date for remodeling of the facility with a completion time set for the beginning of the 2011-2012 academic year.

“Our new Middle School Campus, coupled with the Academic Complex Renovation, has fast-forwarded our strategic plan for the school by about five years,” Peevy said. “As long as we remain mission-driven and student-focused, the future for TFS will be bright and full of promise,” Peevy concluded.

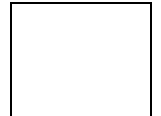
