May 11, 2023, marked the 31st anniversary of the International World Peace (IWPRG) "I Have a Dream" Rose Garden and the eighth year of Atlanta Woman's Club (AWC) maintenance of the garden and sponsorship of this event in partnership with MLK Jr Historical Park and IWPRG. This beautiful celebration, full of inspirational messages of peace, joy and fragrant roses, continues to be held at the Martin Luther King Jr. Historical National Park and the Sanctuary Ebenezer Church located at 407 Auburn Ave NE, Atlanta, Ga at 12:15 PM.

IWPRG Co-founders, Sylvia Villalobos and TJ David the "Rose Man", continue to partner with MLK Jr. Historical National Park, to glorify Dr. Martin Luther & Coretta Scott King's message of Peace through Nonviolence. 31 years ago, in 1992, the rose garden was planted and each year thereafter students from all over the world author poems of thirty-five words or less about Dr. King's message. This year twenty-one entries were selected to be memorialized in this celebration and were placed around the perimeter of the Rose Garden where they will remain for one year. Thousands of visitors to the garden read these poems and are uplifted by their messages and the roses.

IWPRG co-creators, Sylvia Villalobos & TJ David did the Comments and Acknowledgements. Diana Martinez, Vice -President of IWPRG, introduced the first wave of Message of Peace Winners. Sylvia Villalobos, IWPRG, introduced a Past Student Winner, Shuangchen (Sarah) YU, a Doctoral Student at Yale University from Jinan, China. Kym Elder, Acting Deputy Director of NHP, introduced the second wave of Message of Peace Winners. Sandy Huber, Project Director at the University Park World Peace Rose Garden Sister Garden in Stockton, California, introduced the third wave of Messages of Peace Winners. Judy Forte, Superintendent of NHP, made the Congressional Record Presentation from the Office of US Congresswoman Doris Matsui.

After the ceremony, the students and attendees returned to the garden where their poems were unveiled and ended with an exuberant "rose toss." Light refreshments were also provided.



# SO BIG by Edna Ferber



Lit Lovers describes Edna Ferber as an American novelist, short story writer, journalist, and playwright. In addition to SO BIG, the 1925 Pulitzer Prize winner, her works include SHOW BOAT, (1926), GIANT (1952), ICE PALACE, SARATOGA TRUNK, COMARRON (which won an Oscar). Three of these works --- SHOW BOAT, SARATOGA TRUNK AND GIANT were developed into musicals.

Ferber was born in Kalamazoo, Michigan, to a Hungarian-born Jewish shopkeeper and his Milwaukee, Wisconsin born wife, Jacob Charles, and Julia (Neumann) Ferber. After living in Chicago, Illinois, and Ottumwa, Iowa, at age 12, Edna and her family moved to Appleton, Wisconsin where she graduated from high school; and briefly attended Lawrence University. She took newspaper jobs at the Appleton Daily Crescent and the Milwaukee Journal before publishing her first novel. Ferber covered the 1920 Republican National Convention and 1920 Democratic National Convention for the United Press Association.

Ferber never married, had no children, and is not known to have had any romantic or sexual involvement. In her early novel Dawn O'Hara, the title character's aunt is said to have remarked, "Being an old maid was a great deal like death by drowning—a delightful sensation when you ceased struggling" Ferber did take a maternal interest in the career of her niece Janet Fox, and actress who performed in the original Broadway cast of Ferber's play Dinner at Eight and Stage Door.

Ferber died at her home in New York City, of stomach cancer, at the age of eighty-two. (From Wikipedia)

SO BIG is a classic novel of turn of the century Chicago and is widely considered to be Edna Ferber's greatest novel. As Burton Roscoe wrote in the NY Tribune, "I genuflect in homage to Ms. Ferber's narrative and descriptive prose.

SO BIG is the unforgettable story of Selina Peake DeJong, daughter of a gambler, Simeon Peake, and her struggles to stay afloat, keep her dignity and her sanity in the face of marriage to Pervus DeJong, and single parenthood with son Dirk aka 'So Big' DeJong.

A brilliant literary masterpiece so remarkable it continues to resonate with it unflinching view of poverty, sexism the drive for success, and the pursuit of and the need for beauty and self-expression in our lives.


