### WOMEN'S HISTORY

### Get to Know Mrs. Rebecca D. Lowe

One must turn the history books back quite a few years to learn about our founder and first club President. I invite you to learn more about Mrs. Lowe to see how her influence guides our work to this day. Rebecca Douglas was born in August of 1844 in LaGrange, Georgia. She married William Lowe in January of 1868 in Georgia's Troup County. Following the death of her husband, she married New York magazine editor George Gunton in 1904. She died in Atlanta on August 6, 1918 and is buried in Atlanta's renowned Oakland Cemetery, the city's oldest cemetery and the resting place of many notable people.

In 1895, the council of the national (now international) General Federation of Women's Clubs met in Atlanta and Mrs. Lowe was present. Not long after this meeting, she invited a group of interested women to her home. From this gathering, the Atlanta Woman's Club was formed in 1895 and Mrs. Lowe was elected the Club's first President. She then in 1896 invited 17 Georgia women's clubs to meet and they formed the Georgia Federation of Women's Clubs electing her their first President. In 1898, she was elected national President of the General Federation of Women's Clubs (GFWC) which took her to Washington, D.C. where she provided strong leadership as the 3rd President from 1898-1902 of the organization whose mission is "dedicated to community improvement by enhancing the lives of others through volunteer service." During her leadership, she spoke frequently and in one speech entitled "Women's Opportunity for Social Service", she noted "the salient and most hopeful feature of our organization lies... in the quality of strength, which has enabled us, and will enable us, not only to think things, but do things... to render important service in the uplifting and betterment of humanity..." Those words ring true today as the members of 2018 work towards modern goals with the same theme.

Rebecca died in Atlanta on August 6, 1918. She is buried in Atlanta's renowned Oakland Cemetery, the city's oldest cemetery and the resting place of many notable people. The Atlanta Woman's Club placed a special marker noting her as our club's founder at her resting place in 2015.
