

PUBLIC ISSUES COMMUNITY SERVICE PROGRAM NEWS

The Public Issues CSP workshop at Institute in August was presented by state co-chairmen Patty Laine and Dianne Barlow. They emphasized that each member should obtain a copy of the GFWC-Georgia Yearbook, which is currently available at The Wimbish House. One topic discussed at the workshop was the need for greater support of the Girl Scouts. Patty and Dianne noted that the number of Girl Scouts that have dropped out of the program as teenagers has been a growing concern. Part of the reason is that there are less adult women participating as role models. Other issues discussed in this workshop were public safety, emergency preparedness, and veterans affairs.

The Legislative and Public Policy workshop at Institute was presented by Beth English, who introduced three fascinating speakers. Mary Frances Williams discussed Bill 290, the Family Care Act, which is facing opposition from the Georgia Chamber of Commerce. Julia McConnell discussed minor sex trafficking and how the state government is working with various groups to combat it. Holly McKinney talked about child welfare reform and foster care.

The AWC was represented by nearly two dozen members at the Georgia Justice Project's Back to School Event where everyone worked on various stations including bingo, body cutout art for the kids, and the book table. Some members donated preschool backpacks containing crayons, coloring books, and stuffed animals.
