CONSERVATION COMMUNITY SERVICE PROGRAM NEWS

Conservation CSP members had a lot of fun at Institute in Athens, Georgia this summer. Reading material provided at the conservation workshop provided all sorts of tips and advice for creating a healthier environment. With all the negative information out there, it can be tough to know where to start. One way is to reduce chemical usage. Here are two easy, natural recipes for eliminating weeds and cleaning windows:

- For weeds, use 1 gallon of white vinegar, 2 cups of Epson Salts, and ¼ cup of Dawn dish detergent (original blue one). Put all ingredients into a spray bottle, spray directly onto weeds, and watch those weeds disappear!
- For clean windows, mix in a bucket 1 pint of distilled vinegar and 4 pints of water. Dip a sponge into the bucket and rub the solution

across the entire surface of the window. Work as quickly as possible and dry the window with a squeegee.

Conserving water, disposing of toxic waste properly, helping to identify water pollutants, using less electricity, producing less waste, composting, planting native plants and trees, and joining a group working to protect Georgia from industrial waste are additional ways to help preserve the planet.

Besides attending the Institute, the Conservation CSP has other exciting events coming up, and they are looking for volunteers!

The AWC/National Wildlife Federation (NWF) Youth Leadership Summit is planned for the week of October 6, 2014 at the Wimbish House, and 35 high school student leaders are needed to help out. Please keep in mind, however, that the dates are dependent upon speaker availability and may change.

The 2014 Halloween Hikes sponsored by and held at the Chattahoochee Nature Center will take place on Oct 17-18 and Oct 24-25 from 6:00 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. 20 trail guides (per night) are needed to hike several half-mile loops on lighted trails.
