A SEEDED EVENT

Over the summer, The Atlanta Woman's Club met with both the Giving Kitchen and the Georgia Campaign for Adolescent Power and Potential to discuss partnering together for a future fundraising event, one to be held in the winter of 2016 and one to be held in the spring of 2017, respectively. The Giving Kitchen, a 501(c)(3) organization, is a resource at times of unanticipated crisis for anyone employed in the Atlanta restaurant community. More specifically, the Giving Kitchen provides emergency assistance grants to cover basic living expenses, care-related travel expenses, and funeral expenses for those who meet defined criteria. This year, The Atlanta Woman's Club's holiday party will be a "party with a purpose," coinciding with a fundraising event to raise money for the Giving Kitchen. Additionally, in the spring of 2017, The Atlanta Woman's Club will partner with the Georgia Campaign for Adolescent Power and Potential for a fundraising event to benefit the organization. The Georgia Campaign for Adolescent Power and Potential, whose founder is Jane Fonda, focuses on decreasing teen pregnancy, increasing and improving physical activity and nutrition in teen children, and learning healthy relationship patterns for teens. In addition to these events, in January 2017, The Atlanta Woman's Club will host its second annual fundraising event benefitting YouthSpark, a 501(c)(3) organization that aims to transform the lives of youth, who are at risk for exploitation and abuse. And, in August 2017, The Atlanta Woman's Club will host a fundraising event benefitting Operation Peace, an organization that provides students with an afterschool and summer program, which promotes academic achievement for more than 150 youth in the Old Fourth Ward. Information to obtain tickets to these events will be forthcoming.



Hope everyone is having a great summer. The Conservation CSP volunteered for the Chattahoochee Nature Center's Annual Butterfly Festival and is "snipping blooms" weekly in the World Peace Rose Garden at the MLK Jr. Historic National Park as well as planning for 2016-17 activities.

Janecia and Jade Heard, Azam Zadeh, Laytona Jordan, Page Henry and Penny Blackford spent a delightful day at the Chattahoochee Nature Center on Sunday, June 1, 2016. In addition to the traditional face painting activities, we helped for the first time, to construct a village for the fairies. The children and their parents were most imaginative creating a variety of houses with doors, windows, paths, swimming pools, B-B-Qs, swings, gardens, benches, beds, couches all out of native materials such as rocks, leaves, wood, pine cones, flowers and ferns. It was reminiscent of those carefree days of playing in the woods before electronic entertainment.
