Institute was very informative and was presented differently. This year everyone had the opportunity to visit over 20 booths in Marketplace. Attendees rotated throughout the market visiting the booths where they received information about an organization or about CSP projects. The attendees received a stamp on their passport and at the end received a badge for participation.

Suellen Brazil, GFWC Second Vice President, attended Institute and brought greetings on Saturday morning and was the keynote speaker on Saturday night. She shared her experiences and information she has obtained in her over 43 years in club work. She is from Alabama and during her time as a member she has held many offices including GFWC Alabama Director of Junior Clubs, Alabama state president and Southern Region president.

Suellen touched on projects for 2018-2020. This includes GFWC returning to its roots of advocacy work. GFWC will select two bills which we will work to become law.

that members will donate 1,000 pairs of used shoes to Soles 4 Souls or Nike's "reuse-a-shoe" program

that members will donate 1,000 Dr. Seuss books by March of 2020

that 1,000 members will join the Legislative Action Center

that members will do 1,000 projects devoted to women in the military

that 1,000 members will donate \$1,000 to the Capital Campaign

I'm sure there will be information on the projects in GFWC News & Notes, and our CSP chairs will consider how they might incorporate the initiatives into their programs.

As you can see it was a very interesting and informative weekend at Institute.


