Happy 382nd Birthday to the National Guard

Thursday, December 13 marks the 382nd birthday of the National Guard, the reserve military force oldest military force in the Department of Defense, which was founded in 1663 in Massachusetts. According to the National Guard web site:



"We recognize December 13th as the birthday of the National Guard. On this date in 1636, the first militia regiments in North America were organized in Massachusetts. Based upon an order of the Massachusetts Bay Colony's General Court, the colony's militia was organized into three permanent regiments to better defend the colony. Today, the descendants of these first regiments - the 181st Infantry, the 182nd Infantry, the 101st Field Artillery, and the 101st Engineer Battalion of the Massachusetts Army National Guard – share the distinction of being the oldest units in the U.S. military. December 13, 1636, thus marks the beginning of the organized militia, and the birth of the Na-

tional Guard's oldest organized units is symbolic of the founding of all the state, territory, and District of Columbia militias that collectively make up today's National Guard."

PUBLIC ISSUES CONT'D

The states' militias were officially given the name National Guard in 1933. In 1947, the Air National Guard was created as the reserve component of the Air Force.

Today, roughly 435,000 men and women serve in the National Guard and the Air National Guard, with an average mobilization of 30,000+ around the world. Women in AWC History to Know

Dr. Passie Fenton Ottley, Second President of AWC, 1896-1897 Passie was born in Columbus, Mississippi on March 16, 1870.

Education: Mary Baldwin Seminary in Staunton, VA Mississippi College for Women University of Chicago University of Georgia where she earned her Doctorate of Literature

Her community involvement: Chairman of the Georgia Library Commission

WOMENS HISTORY CONT'D

From an article on GLA:

In 1897 the "Georgia Library Club" was founded by members of the Young Men's Library of Georgia and GA Federal Women's Club. At its first meeting the name was changed to Georgia Library Association. Its goals were funding of public libraries, the establishment of a library training school and the appointment of a library commission. In 1906 the Free Public Library for African Americans opened in Savannah paid for by city funds and subscription fees.

Article from News of Women's Clubs:

Mrs. Ottley gave support to the successful kindergarten program for African American children carried on under the auspices of a committee appointed by GFWC. She is recognized as the inspiration for the committee, since she and Mrs. Lowe paid the expenses to Montgomery, AL where the Federation met, of Alice Carey, an intelligent African American woman from Atlanta. She was able to carry to the convention suggestion of the Kindergarten movement. Atlanta Kindergarten was given support and equipment from a few ladies including Mrs. Ottley.

A description of Mrs. Ottley from a Memorial for the Georgian Library Commission: Throughout her 30 years of service with the library commission, her wise extraordinary finesse and her never failing enthusiasm were instilled which brought the services of operated under her to a high state of effectiveness and gave them a place in real social significance in the life of the state.

She was married to John King Ottley, President of the 4th National Bank. They had 2 children, resided on Peachtree Road with a home at the site of Lenox Mall.
