### WOMEN'S HISTORY: PHOENIX FLIES



As a continuation of the Women's History Committee Phoenix Flies article last month, the committee will share interesting anecdotes about visitors attending the tours. AWC had 25 visitors to participate in the March 11, 2022, tours. Like in past years, as member docents, dressed in period costume by decade, retold the AWC and Wimbish House history visitors reciprocated with delightful stories of their own. This year was no different. Susan Polk and her brother, LeRoy Polk Jr. came again this year asking where was the "blue room." They believed this room is where their mother lived in the Wimbish House because the reference to the "blue room" was made in a

note that Susan and Leroy's father LeRoy Polk Sr., kept all his life. The note simply said Betty, blue room. Susan and LeRoy think this must have been the note that their father wrote down when he obtained information to call or visit his future bride and Susan and LeRov's future mother Betty at the Wimbish house. This detail may have been needed to identify which room Betty lived in at the Wimbish House. Although the exact dates are not known Mary Elizabeth "Betty" rented a room in the Wimbish house in the thirties until her wedding on June 21, 1941. According to the AJC article and picture provided by Susan and LeRoy, Betty had both her wedding shower and reception at the Wimbish house.

LeRoy also fondly remembered his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Polk, who owned a boarding house at 63 14<sup>th</sup> Street, mentioning that she frequently went to the Wimbish House to play bridge.

Another serendipitous happening was Liza Dolensky and her friend Bobby Jo who came dressed in vintage clothing circa 1920's. The lovely costumes led to questions and Liza shared that she runs Better Dresses Vintage and The Atlanta Time Travelers. As time travelers, folks dress up to the best of their abilities. Participants buy or sew period correct costumes, but others make do with what they have in their closet or can put together from found items. In setting up the group Liza was adamant that no one would

What better way to celebrate EARTH DAY, April 22, 2022, than to take the Atlanta Beltline Arboretum tour with Trees Atlanta volunteer docent Sandy Murray and Vanessa Miot Trees Atlanta staff? Page Henry, Environment CSP chair, Penny Blackford, Isabel Urrutia, and Sheila Payne met at the Beltline in the Highlands behind the now closed Parish restaurant on a lovely sunshiny morning.

As we walked toward Ponce City Market we learned many interesting facts; for example about, the white rhino sculpture, other monuments along the way, sassafras trees, tiny doors, graffiti, chimney swift's tower, 33 species of oak sculptures, excelsior trees and the excelsior mill, the old Sears Building which is now Ponce City Market, Ralph McGill, AJC editor & publisher, Jane Fonda, movie star and magnolia trees that live to be 100 years old, just to mention a few.

You may know that sassafras leaves can be made into tea, but did you know the root was used for root beer until it was found that it contained arsenic? Also, the leaves are unique in that they have different leaf configurations on one branch. One participant asked if graffiti was legal on Beltline. The answer was, no but is tolerated on cement





but that the sidewalks are made of material that graffiti cannot adhere to. Sandy our docent showed us the excelsior tree whose bark was used as packing materials by Sears and told us that the old Masquerade Club, which was recently renovated, was the Excelsior mill. Sandy informed us that when Sears was being renovated to become Ponce De Leon Market, there were 60,000 windows that were hand removed, cleaned, and replaced or restored. As we crossed Ralph McGill Blvd, we were told how Ralph McGill and Mayor Ivan Allan were leading voices for ethnic tolerance in the

South from the 1940s through the sixties and after segregation was outlawed in 1959. Ralph Mc Gill was called "The Conscience of the South and was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for editorial writing that same year. We learned that Jane Fonda's condominium that was on the corner of Freedom Parkway and Ralph McGill sold for \$6,000,000 and that apartments with windows overlooking belt line get higher rents. We saw chimney swift towers that have been erected to provide habitat for these birds who have fewer chimneys to nest in.

For those who have not visited the Beltline recently the views are magnificent, the development is extensive

with attractive new buildings, a lovely entrance to the Beltline from Ponce City Market, a great Kroger's with scenic patio, in addition to delightful restaurants that face the Beltline.
