PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greetings from another rainy day in Atlanta. I know all of us are ready for sunshine. It appears to be sunshiny on Friday February 21st, Arbor Day, to plant trees. March is Women's History month, Dr. Seuss Day on March 2nd, election of officers for the Atlanta Woman's Club and Arbor Day in Georgia. Arbor Day was founded in Nebraska in the 1870's by Julius Sterling Morton who moved to the state and purchased land that was a desolate plain. He advocated for the ecological importance of planting trees and Arbor Day was started.

GFWC is planning an event to celebrate the 100th Anniversary of Women winning the Right to Vote. The celebration of the suffrage movement includes writing to members of Congress asking them to support the Women's History and Nineteenth Amendment Centennial Quarter Dollar Coin Program Act. GFWC strongly supports the passage of H.R. 1923 and S.2427, The Women's History and Nineteenth Amendment Centennial Quarter Dollar Coin Program. This Act would create a new series of commemorative circulating coins which highlight women suffragists and other GFWC members that were on the forefront of women's suffrage with the delegation marching in the 1913 Suffrage Parade on Pennsylvania Ave. Many of the leaders of the suffrage movement were GFWC members including Carrie Chapman Catt, Jane Adams, and Lizzie Crozier French, Ellen Henrotin and Sarah Decker Platt; the last two were GFWC presidents. A formal endorsement came in 1924 with a resolution supporting "political equality of men and women." GFWC is planning a Women's History Event at the national office on March 5th called *Amending America*: How Women Won the Vote featuring Kate Campbell Stevenson.

On March 2nd, Dr. Seuss Day is celebrated. All clubs are working toward the goal of donating 5000 more books by June 2020. GFWC has participated in these birthday parties over the years with some of the approaches including: raising awareness about bullying, sponsoring an event at a public library, distributing books across school districts, engaging public officials in the events. There are websites that give ideas

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on how to celebrate Dr. Seuss's birthday such as Seusville.com. The AWC and the NW District have participated in donating Dr. Seuss books.

The election of officers will take place at our March meeting. Thanks to all members submitting their names for office. This is a commitment of leadership for a 2-year period. These officers will lead and represent the AWC in many ways. They have prepared information about their abilities to perform the duties of the office they have agreed to take. The officers to elect are: President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, and two Board of Trustee members.



PUBLIC SAFETY REMINDER: The Wimbish House is a weapons-free facility.

As a privately-owned property, The Wimbish House is allowed to opt out of Georgia's Safe Carry Protection Act and clear notices to that effect are posted on site and included in our event contracts. Anyone – member, visitor or guest – in possession of a weapon of any kind will be asked to leave the premises, subject to arrest for criminal trespass. The only exception is paid security staff while on duty.

The police will be called any time this policy is violated, and this policy will be equally enforced.

GA Leaders Face Choice Between Tax Cuts for High Income Earners and Funding Key State Priorities

Amid ongoing budget cuts, three major proposals being considered by Georgia lawmakers could have significant implications for taxpayers and state revenues, according to the latest report from the Georgia Budget & Policy Institute:

House Bill 918 would lower the state's top income tax rate again, a move that would cost the state about \$615 million per year and send the majority of the savings to the state's highest earners at the expense of low- and middle-income families.

House Bill 432 would create a flat tax that raises taxes for an estimated 647,000 low- and middle-income households across Georgia. It would also direct 84% of the total savings to corporations and the top 5% of households in the state.

House Bill 588 would create a state-level Earned Income Tax Credit that offers a modest, non-refundable tax cut to low- and moderate-income families earning up to \$56,000 per year.

Shouldn't Georgia seek tax reform that allows the state to increase revenue collections while simultaneously reducing the amount of taxes owed by many low- to middle-income taxpayers?

Returning citizens released from prison face significant legal barriers to successful reentry, including a lack of access to legal services. This program examines the unique role of Reentry Lawyering by providing background on Georgia's criminal justice system, the civil and criminal legal barriers facing citizens returning to society, and legal remedies to address these barriers, such as include resolving active detainers, reinstating suspended driver's licenses, modifying child support arrears, and expunging criminal records. CONSERVATION



The Conservation CSP will host the March 9, 2020 General Meeting. We are honored to have Sylvia Villalobos and TJ David, co-creators of International World Peace Rose Gardens (IWPRG) and Marty Smith, Lead Ranger at the Martin Luther King (MLK), Jr National Historical Park, as our guest speakers.

International World Peace Rose Gardens is a catalyst for peace in diverse communities around the world. The nonprofit organization incorporated in 1988 for the purpose of creating beautiful rose gardens for peace on public, accessible sites. The gardens become magnetic centers where

people gather, enjoy beauty and are inspired to be better persons and world citizens. Ten World Peace Rose Gardens and sister gardens have been planted on some of the most cultural, historic and sacred grounds of the world. The projects, including IWPRG youth programs, have impacted millions around the world. Atlanta's MLK, Jr National Historical Park is one of those sacred grounds and the "I Have a Dream" Rose Garden was established in 1992. The Rose is the national flower of the United States and the state flower of Georgia.

AWC became involved with this garden in 2015 when Karen Johnson, Conservation CSP Chair visited the MLK Jr. National Historical Park with friends and became concerned about the condition of the Rose Garden. Karen's concern led her to inquire of park staff who was responsible for the garden. She learned it was the International World Peace Rose Gardens co-founders, Sylvia Villalobos & TJ David. Karen contacted them and asked if there was anything the Atlanta Woman's Club could do to assist. The rest is history. For the past six years AWC's Conservation CSP has provided much needed funds to maintain the spraying and fertilization of the garden and AWC Conservation CSP members volunteer their time and expertise to snip the spent blooms from May to November. These members are affectionately called "MLK Angels" by TJ and nicknamed, "Snippets" by the club and help to maintain the lovely blooms and enhance the visitors' experiences. AWC has also provided volunteers to work the annual anniversary celebration to honor students for their poems commemorating peace. Their engraved plaques line the rose garden and AWC donated funds for the winners' prize medallions as well as refreshments for the participants and their families.

Sylvia Villalobos is Co-Creator and President of International World Peace Rose Gardens. Her major contribution has been to conceptualize, develop and coordinate IWPRG's youth programs, including: the "World Peace Begins with Me" Art Program, the Inspirational Messages of Peace Contest, the Flower Pots of Friendship Project, Qualities of Peace initiative and the International Friendship Project. The youth programs are in conjunction with events at the different World Peace Rose Gardens around the world and have involved more than 38,880 youth, including international students. Other roles include planning and coordinating rose garden and community events, such as the International Day of Peace and Dedication and Anniversary Ceremonies; also, building and maintaining liaisons with community, public officials and businesses; and coordinating fundraising strategies, to name a few. Her efforts have been honored throughout the years by organizations and public entities, such as, the "Unsung Hero" Award by California State Senator Richard Pan, Special Recognition for 25 Years of Service by the Martin Luther King, Jr. National Historical Park, and the Sacramento Woman Community Leader of Peace recognition by the Sacramento City Council. She credits her upbringing in a loving Latino family, plus early inspiration by various peacemakers, for instilling in her the practice of working for peace in a nonviolent, loving way.

Thomas James David, better known as "TJ the Rose Man," is Co-Creator and Rose Garden Designer/Rose Grower of International World Peace Rose Gardens. He also serves as the Chief Financial Officer and Chief Operations Officer. His deep passion for roses has led him to discover unique rose-growing techniques that have maximized the health, beauty and vigor of roses in all IWPRG's public rose gardens and five test gardens. He has been featured in the All-America

Rose Selections' video, "Love at First Sight, America's Affair with the Rose;" talk shows; was honored as "Volunteer of the Year" by the Washington Unified School District in West Sacramento; received an "Unsung Hero" Award by California State Senator Richard Pan, Special Recognition for 25 Years of Service by the Martin Luther King, Jr. National Historical Park and was highly responsible for the State Capitol World Peace Rose Garden being named as one of America's Top 10 Best Public Rose Gardens in 2010. TJ's engaging personality and love of roses have truly been useful in promoting "the Rose," the official flower of the United States, as a silent ambassador of peace throughout the world.

His love of country, and the world, stems from a loving, hard-working family and his military service in the U.S. Army. His humanitarian work and establishment of World Peace Rose Gardens throughout the world impact millions of yearly visitors to the various garden sites, including the 1.7 million who visit the Martin Luther King, Jr. National Historical Park each year. TJ says of himself, "I am committed to excellence because mediocrity does not appeal to me!"

Marty Smith is a Lead Ranger at the MLK Jr Historic National Park and has been serving at the site since 1991. He has many administrative duties which includes overseeing the Volunteer Program for the Park. As a ranger, he also serves as a tour guide and compass to visitors and helps them absorb the importance of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr's legacy and the Historical Park.
