CONSERVATION

Conservation Chair Karen Johnson attended LEADS on August 19, 2016 and Institute in Athens, Ga. on August 20, 2016. Other CSP members attending Institute and the Conservation Workshop at Institute were Penny Blackford, Page Henry, Judine Heard, Judy Reece, Connie Morris and Judith Behrens. Highlights of the Conservation Workshop were: State Chair Cindy Tisdale and Co-chair Catherine Douds, presented many great ideas such as planting Pollinator Gardens, for bees and butterflies, planting Milkweed for Monarch Butterflies, reading to school children about Conservation, and a quiz on how long it takes glass, nylon, plastic bottles, magazines, Styrofoam, disposable diapers, aluminum cans, and pop can holders to decompose. This year Conservation CSP has partnered with Captain Planet to plant milkweed in Captain Planet supported school gardens and we are pursuing information about plantings in public lands.



The Conservation CSP continued to be busy "snipping blooms" each week this summer in the World Peace Rose Garden at the MLK Jr. Historic National Park and preparing the annual entry in the Atlanta Botanical Gardens Scarecrow event. Special thanks go to: Penny Blackford, Karen Bacheller, Karen Johnson, Page Henry, Catherine Moore and Azam Zedah whom created our "Spirit of Diversity" scarecrow at Page Henry's club house, to Anita Jansen who crocheted the GFWC logo "Unity in Diversity" sash, and to Billie Harris and her husband

who transported our scarecrow to the Atlanta Botanical Gardens where she is displayed in the Children's Garden through October 31st. Penny Blackford, Karen Johnson, Azam Zedeh, Lexa King, Catherine Smith, and Karen Bacheller visited as a group on October 21, 2016 and other members are encouraged to attend throughout October.

In addition to maintaining the World Peace Rose Garden, and Milkweed plantings, other upcoming Conservation CSP plans are to partner with Historic Oakland Cemetery to beautify the historic African American part of the Cemetery which includes the graves of many slaves, possibly to restore Rebecca Lowe's grave site, to conduct a second Conservation Youth Leadership Conference, and to beautify the National Park Service owned historic homes that accompany the MLK Jr. National Historic site. Our mission is to establish a permanent, loving home to displaced exotic animals where they will be provided with a diverse diet, an educational habitat, and daily enrichment activities. The Haven Zoo will promote public awareness of conservation issues and animal welfare as well as develop and implement an international survival plan for endangered/critically endangered species. The Haven Zoo's founder and CEO, Johnie Sue Thurman, has been working with exotic animals for over fourteen years in the Atlanta area as well as volunteering and interning at private zoos for ten years. Johnie Sue earned her Master's degree in Anthropology from Georgia State University in 2014, where she focused on human and primate interactions in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. She received an international affiliation with the Federal University of Brazil to complete her thesis and post-thesis research in Rio de Janeiro.

The Haven Zoo is very excited to be hosting our first fundraising gala on December 4, 2016 at the Clarkston Community Center. The fundraiser will feature a silent auction, entertainment, animal encounters, dining, and family-friendly activities. Tickets are available at <u>thehavenzoo.org/events</u>. All proceeds will go directly towards land acquisition so we can begin rescuing exotic animals. We look forward to seeing everyone there!
