# Honeybee Lecture at Trees Atlanta Kendeda House

This year's Autumn Equinox occurred on Saturday September 23rd, 2023 which marks the astronomical end of summer and the beginning of autumn in the northern hemisphere. Now that Fall is officially here, you, like me, may find yourself in a garden state of mind. As I contemplate additions to the garden I search for plants and trees that will attract our dwindling pollinators such as bees, butterflies and some species of hummingbirds.

The lecture I attended by Jimmy Gatts, current president of the Metro Atlanta Beekeepers' Association was very helpful in determining those plants and trees. His informative slide presentation described how pollination occurs, who are the most important pollinators, why pollination is so important, plants and trees that attract pollinators. He also discussed why lawns are harmful to pollinators; how mulch is your friend, can be freely obtained, and where to obtain more information.

A pollinator is anything that helps carry pollen from the male part of the flower (stamen) to the female part



of the same or another flower (stigma.) This movement must occur for the plant to become fertilized and to produce fruit, seeds and young plants. Pollinators play a vital role in plant reproduction, making them fundamental to supporting healthy ecosystems. Bees are the most important pollinators. Fertilizing over 110 different crops, (fruit trees to strawberries) other pollinators are butterflies, hummingbirds.

Bees prefer fruit & fruit trees (plumb, peaches, pomegranate, pears, raspberries, blueberries. Butterflies prefer the mighty oak tree and forbs (herbaceous flowering plants that are not grass, sedge or rush). Bottlebrush, smooth sumac, mildewed, witch hazel and mountain mint are host plants for both bees and butterflies. Plants for bees are not good for hummingbirds. They prefer nectar found in tubular flowers suited for their long tongues like bee balm and trumpet creeper.

The reason lawns are not good for pollinators is that they are a "crop" that do not feed pollinators, use 17 million gallons of gasoline, 90 million pounds of fertilizer, 78 million pounds of pesticides and 50-70 % of portable water is lost to evaporation. To counteract this homeowner in Wisconsin, Kentucky and Massachusetts started "NO MOW MAY." Homeowners deliberately neglected to mow their lawns to allow plants like dandelions and clover to bloom for the bees.



Mulch is your friend and is vital for trees and plant growth and reduces the amount of watering that needs to be done. Mulch can be obtained free by visiting getchipdrop.com to sign up for free mulch delivery. Specify no pine and keep in mind that five to six cubic yards of mulch will be delivered. It will be dumped on your lawn, and they will not spread it.
