# AWC COVID-19 RELIEF FUND

In light of the current public health crisis, AWC designated \$20,000 of our annual budget to aid nonprofit organizations that have been adversely affected by COVID-19. In June, a committee was convened consisting of the AWC Club President, AWC Treasurer, outgoing AWC 1st VP (in charge of CSPs) and the AWC Seeded Event Chair. A list of close to 50 organizations that AWC has served and supported in the last two years through CSPs and Seeded Events was compiled, and in mid July, those organizations were invited to apply for funding. 15 applications were received, and the committee will score them and announce funding decisions by August 31st. Almost every applicant replied indicating how much the opportunity meant to them and how grateful they were for the ongoing support of AWC.

## **Daisy Luckey Aukerman**



Daisy S. Aukerman is the only member in the Atlanta Woman's Club 125-year history to have served 3 terms as AWC's President: 1984-1986, March 1989-May 1990, and 2004-2006. She has given generously of her time as a leader and her talents as a pianist. A statuesque beauty who worked as a model in her younger years, Daisy is richly blessed with warmth, elegance, intelligence, sensitivity, and sense of decorum clearly evident whether she was behind the podium or interacting with a club member or friend. Because of these qualities, her dedication to the Club, her gracious presence, and her knowledge of AWC's triumphs as well as its challenges, members often sought her wise counsel.

Daisy was AWC's President in 1990 during a particularly difficult time in the Club's history when the Club suffered 2 burglaries and the first of 2 fires that severely damaged the Wimbish House. After surviving the 2nd disastrous fire in 2000 and undergoing significant renovations, the Club benefitted from Daisy's 3rd term as President in 2004-2006.

Experiencing an especially stressful time in 2009, the Club made great progress thereafter in decorative and maintenance upgrades and saw membership increase as the Wimbish House became a highly desirable venue for weddings and other special events. The Atlanta Woman's Club necessarily operates as a team of diverse, highly skilled and talented women working together to better the lives of people, women and children in particular. Daisy is one of our longstanding treasures. Having experienced many Club triumphs and challenges during her history at AWC, she said to me with obvious delight and pride in 2017, "The Club—the Wimbish House—has never looked better, been better than it is now!"

Daisy is greatly appreciated, too, by Club members for her beautiful piano music which greeted members for many years as they descended the ballroom stairs for monthly luncheon meetings. An accomplished pianist, she played the piano often at Club special events, including Spring Teas and Holiday Parties.

In "A Light on Peachtree: A History of the Atlanta Woman's Club" by Anne B. Jones, Ph.D. (Mercer University Press, 2012, p, 117), Daisy is quoted: "The Atlanta Woman's Club is unique. I give my time to help build a future worthy of the sacrifice of women who had great vision, women who gave their best. I'm glad to be a part of it." We are glad you have been a part of it, too! With much appreciation, we salute and thank you for all that you mean and have given to the Atlanta Woman's Club in your 40-year membership.
